Thank you for sending through the article from Dr Newman and your inquiries.

We note that the material is not in fact peer reviewed science but an opinion piece and two of the economic papers referred to have been widely critiqued for drawing extremely wide bases for their estimates of economic cost.

Wine Australia is a government authority responsible for regulating wine exports, promoting Australian wine internationally and investing in research and development on behalf of the government and the sector.

Wine Australia's research funds are based on grape and wine levies collected from the sector which are matched by government. Our investments are informed by the strategic research priorities of the Australian Government and the Australian grape and wine community garnered regular and ongoing consultation.

Our investments with the CSIRO cover a number of areas:

- developing and evaluating new winegrape varieties with robust disease resistance
- breeding new rootstocks with greater tolerance to pests, salinity, heat and water stress
- developing new strategies to manage harvest timing and alleviate compressed ripening and harvest windows caused by climate change
- new digital technologies to better estimate yield, crop condition and grape quality, and
- future proofing Australia's grapevine germplasm.

Producing wines with unique flavours from grape varieties bred specifically for Australian conditions is only one aspect of the funded research.

The grape and wine community is a significant contributor to Australia's economy, generating over \$40 billion per annum, supporting more than 172,000 full and part-time jobs, most of which

are in regional areas. The wine and grape sector is not only a major regional employer but helps drive regional tourism, another significant economic contributor and employer. (source)

Wine Australia funds CSIRO researchers to carry out the work described above and on occasion funds researcher's travel to learn overseas and to collaborate with other researchers. Researchers may attend dinners during the course of their work and in their collaborations with other researchers. Wine Australia does not provide gifts to researchers, nor fund dinners or conference attendances.

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
